Articulation Agreement

Ohio University Bachelor of Technical & Applied Studies and Washington State Community College Associate of Applied Science and Applied Business

This ARTICULATION AGREEMENT (Agreement) is entered into on February 7, 2013 (the "Effective Date") by Ohio University, with an address of Athens, OH 45701; and Washington State Community College, with an address of 710 Colegate Drive, Marietta, OH 45750.

Ohio University and Washington State Community College wish to provide a mechanism whereby students have access to a seamless educational path starting with an associate degree and leading to the completion of a baccalaureate degree. This partnership will be formalized through the use of a defined Articulation Agreement. The Agreement will allow for students at Washington State Community College to seamlessly transfer:

1. earned associate degree in stated area
2. technical and academic coursework beyond the associate degree (bridge coursework), including general education (Tier I and II) and program major requirements: as detailed by Agreement

In accordance with university policy, the Agreement will ensure the minimum residency requirement of 30 semester hours and at least 50% of the major coursework at Ohio University: total of 120 credit hours for degree completion. To obtain this requirement, Ohio University courses may be delivered to complete the baccalaureate degree via:

1. Classroom or online delivery by Washington State Community College
2. Online or classroom delivery by Ohio University

TERMS OF AGREEMENT:

Students must meet the following requirements to be eligible for admission to Ohio University under this Agreement.

1. Minimum grade point average of 2.0 at the associate degree level
2. Completed associate degree from Washington State Community College in applied science or applied business
 - a. Students who do not have a completed technical associate's degree must have completed a minimum of 60 semester credit hours, including 24 related technical hours.
 - b. Applications from students without a completed associate's degree will be reviewed separately by the Program Director for the Technical & Applied Studies degree.
3. Admission to Ohio University
4. Prerequisite coursework for the Ohio University major/program area:
 - a. none

Ohio University and Washington State Community College do hereby agree to the following institutional terms:

1. This Agreement is not exclusive, and either party may enter into similar agreements with any other party.
2. Ohio University and Washington State Community College will exchange lists of current courses from which credit may be applied, copies of the master syllabi, and

course outlines as deemed necessary, on an annual basis. Once reviewed, courses that meet direct equivalency standards from Washington State Community College to Ohio University will be added into the Ohio University Transfer Subject Area screen in the PeopleSoft.

3. Designated representatives from each institution will confer annually to review each area and make amendments, as necessary, based on curriculum changes. Articulation courses may be added or removed from the articulation table at this time.
4. This Agreement defines a pathway by which a student could articulate the defined associate's degree from Washington State Community College into the bachelor's degree program in Technical & Applied Studies at Ohio University. Due to individual student factors, including but not limited to part-time or full-time status, need for developmental coursework, scheduling and availability of courses, all students may not be able to complete the listed pathway in the time projected. This Agreement does not guarantee the completion of a baccalaureate in four years, or in two years beyond the associate degree level.
5. This Agreement does not guarantee a student's admission to Ohio University or acceptance into the Technical & Applied Studies program. All students who meet the minimum criteria set forth above will be considered for admission in accordance with standard Ohio University admissions application evaluation criteria.
6. All financial aid issues are the responsibility of the student. This Agreement does not guarantee the provision of any aid the student may seek upon application to Ohio University.
7. Students are responsible for completing all Ohio University general education, major, and residency requirements.
8. Upon admission to Ohio University, the students will be responsible for compliance with all applicable university rules.
9. This Agreement defines the respective rights and responsibilities of Ohio University and Washington State Community College and does not confer any rights or entitlements upon any individual students.

SPECIFIC TERMS TO AGREEMENT: PROGRAM DELIVERY

The following details the specific design to the program agreement between the Ohio University Bachelor of Technical & Applied Studies (BTAS) and Washington State Community College's Associate of Applied Science and Associate of Applied Business programs.

1. The BTAS will be offered as a partnership program wherein students will take coursework at both Ohio University and Washington State Community College in order to complete the degree requirements.
2. Students will apply to the program online, using the eCampus Community College Partnership site. Transcripts of all previous college-level work will be submitted to the Undergraduate Admissions office, Attention eCampus. Students must meet the previously stated entry criteria in order to be considered for admission into the program: Terms of Agreement.
3. Student transcripts will be reviewed for direct equivalencies at Ohio University. Courses that satisfy general education and major requirements will be applied to the student's Ohio University Degree Audit Reporting System (DARS).
 - a. Students will be expected to satisfy the Ohio University Tier 1 quantitative and English and all Tier II requirements by taking equivalent courses at Washington State Community College: either as part of their associate's degree or beyond it as bridge coursework. SEE APPENDIX A.
 - b. Students will be expected to complete three courses that satisfy BTAS major requirements by taking equivalent courses at Washington State Community College: either as part of their associate's degree or beyond it as bridge coursework. If more than three BTAS electives are transferred in, students must

- replace the courses with Ohio University electives. (*Specific elective courses will not be delivered on a guaranteed online schedule.*) SEE APPENDIX B.
- c. Students are expected to transfer a minimum of 60 credit hours to Ohio University.
 - d. Students are expected to complete 30 credit hours and 50% of the BTAS major coursework at Ohio University.
4. Students will receive individualized academic advising from an Ohio University advisor. Advising will include planning for both Washington State Community College and Ohio University course selections.
 5. Coursework:
 - a. Students will register for Washington State Community College courses at Washington State Community College and will pay the Washington State Community College tuition and fees
 - b. Students will register for Ohio University courses through the partnership Web site and will pay the Ohio University tuition and fees established for the partnership program
 - c. If taking Ohio University and Washington State Community College courses concurrently, a financial aid consortium agreement will be required to process payment of state or federal aid
 6. Miscellaneous elements: Washington State Community College will
 - a. Allow an Ohio University representative to
 - i. Distribute partnership materials
 - ii. Present to constituent groups: faculty, staff, students, alumni
 - b. Allow partnership students to
 - i. Simultaneously register for partner courses and Ohio University courses
 - ii. Utilize financial aid consortium agreements
 - iii. Use available student resources while enrolled
 - c. Provide regular updates to Ohio University regarding curricular changes
 - d. Assist in promoting the partnership program
 7. Miscellaneous elements: Ohio University will
 - a. Market the program to Washington State Community College alumni, current students, and future students
 - b. Maintain a guaranteed online course schedule
 - c. Provide academic advising to partnership students
 - d. Provide at-a-distance student services: admissions, registration, financial aid
 - e. Develop useful advising tools for use by both institutions
 - i. General education information
 - ii. Transfer guide
 - iii. Individual degree audit/pathway sheets
 - iv. How to guide
 - v. Orientation materials


MISCELLANEOUS

Each party agrees that it will not unlawfully discriminate against any person on the basis of race, sex, religion, disability, age, national origin, or color.


TERM and TERMINATION

This Agreement will run from the Effective date until June 30, 2016, at which time this Agreement will automatically expire. On or before the stated expiration date, Ohio University and Washington State Community College may extend the TERMS OF AGREEMENT by signing an Articulation Addendum. Either party may terminate this Agreement in the event of a material breach by the other party, effective 90 days after providing a notice that describes the breach to the other party. Upon expiration or termination of this Agreement, students enrolled or admitted to Ohio University will continue to receive the benefits of the Agreement.

Ohio University has a three tiered General Education Requirement that all baccalaureate degree students must fulfill. Tier 1 course requirements build your quantitative and English composition skills; Tier 2 course requirements increase your breadth of knowledge; and the Tier 3 course requirement develops your ability to interrelate, synthesize, and integrate knowledge from different academic disciplines.

Following this guide as you plan your transfer to Ohio University will allow you to complete your Tier 1 and 2 General Education requirements while at Washington State Community College. The junior level Tier 1 English course and the Tier 3 course requirement must be completed at Ohio University.

Please note: This is not an exhaustive list of transfer courses. In fact, every college level course at Washington State Community College is transferable to Ohio University.

Associate of Applied Business Course Distribution Requirements

The Associate of Applied Business (A.A.B.) is awarded to students who successfully complete one of the prescribed curricula in business or public service technologies. The degree is designed to prepare technicians and para-professionals for immediate entry into the workforce upon graduation. Both technical and non-technical courses are required for the A.A.B.

A.A.B. Non-technical Course Requirements

The A.A.B. degree requires 28 semester credits of non-technical studies. Courses may be in two categories:

1. General education requirements consisting of courses in written communication, oral communication, social and behavioral sciences, and arts and humanities. These requirements may also include courses in the natural sciences and in mathematics.
2. Basic related courses include a core of courses basic to the technical field and closely related to the specialty.

Since the non-technical course requirements vary with each program, the student should check the courses required in each program or major.

A.A.B. Technical Course Requirements

For graduation, 32-45 credit hours in technical courses clearly identified with the technical skills, proficiency, and knowledge required for career competency, as prescribed by the academic program. A minimum of 60 up to a maximum of 73 total credit hours is required for graduation depending upon the specific requirements of each degree program.

Associate of Applied Science Course Distribution Requirements

The Associate of Applied Science (A.A.S.) is awarded to students who successfully complete one of the prescribed curricula in industrial engineering, health or public service. The degree is designed to prepare technicians and para-professionals for immediate entry into the workforce upon graduation. Both technical and non-technical courses are required for the A.A.S.

A.A.S. Non-technical Course Requirements

The A.A.S. requires a minimum 28 semester credits of non-technical studies. Courses may be in two categories:

1. General Education requirements consisting of courses in written communication, oral communication, social and behavioral sciences, and arts and humanities. These requirements may also include courses in the natural sciences and in mathematics.
2. Basic Related Courses include a core of courses basic to the technical field and closely related to the specialty.

Since the non-technical course requirements vary with each program, the student should check the courses required in each program or major.
