Four new scholarships were established in 2013. We are grateful to local philanthropists for their continuing support of our College, our students and our Foundation.

The Bettie B. Goehring Memorial Scholarship

This annual scholarship award of \$500 is available to a full-time student with a minimum 3.0 GPA in a Business Technologies field of study. The recipient can be a first year student, a second year student or a continuing education student. The scholarship was established by Mr. Henry Goehring in honor of his wife.

The Dr. Paul Prachun Radiologic Technology Bridge Scholarship

This annual scholarship of two \$500 awards is available in the summer semester to full-time Radiology Technology students with a minimum 3.2 GPA. The scholarship was established by Friends of Dr. Prachun.

The Gail Reynolds Student for Success Scholarship

This annual scholarship award of \$300 is available to a second year full or part-time nontraditional student who is over the age of 30 and who has children. The student must have a minimum 3.0 GPA and graduate in the year of the award. The

scholarship was established by the Washington State Community College Foundation in honor of Gail Reynolds.

The Wendy's Adoption Scholarship

The amount of this annual scholarship award is dependent on fund earnings and student need. The recipient must be in or have been in the foster program or be adopted and the student must be enrolled in a WSCC program of study or enrolled as an entering first year student. The scholarship was established by Ray and Kim Blackburn, owners of several Wendy's restaurants in the area served by Washington State Community College.

Wallner Gift In Support of the Arts

A vintage Steinway Grand Piano was donated to the Foundation by John Wallner and Kathleen Wallner Allen in memory of their mother Patricia Smith Wallner, an ardent supporter of the Evergreen Arts & Humanities series and of performance arts in the Mid-Ohio Valley.

Patricia Smith Wallner was born in and lived her entire life in Marietta. She taught in the local schools, taught piano privately and brought concerts and plays to the community for decades. To continue her lifelong commitment to the cultural life of the community, Patricia wished that her piano remain forever with an institution in Marietta.

The Steinway & Sons Model B Concert Grand, serial number 97662, dates to 1900. It is intended for use in small concert halls.

The piano is special because it is in a beautifully hand-carved Victorian case. This style is rare and features a level of carving that is not available today. The piano is 6' 10" in length.

The piano is designated for use in Graham Auditorium, an intimate 290-seat concert hall on the campus of Washington State Community College, for classes, private lessons, theater performances and performances in association with the Evergreen Arts & Humanities Series.

The gift places a Steinway Grand at the disposal of artists and performers.

The Patricia S. Wallner estate determined that the piano can be fully restored and rebuilt using original Steinway parts for \$30,000. The value following restoration will be approximately \$70,000. The estate will contribute to the restoration and will support the Foundation in its efforts to secure the additional funds required for restoration.

John Wallner, a veteran fundraiser, will work with the Foundation to develop a prospectus and will solicit donors that have been connected with the donor's projects for many years. Mr. Wallner also plans to seek gifts to help cover the cost of restoration from other foundations.

Message from the College President

Giving Options — Giving Opportunities

Gifts to Washington State Community College Foundation, regardless of size, benefit our students, the college, and ultimately the communities in which our students live and work. Every gift is significant because every gift helps to promote quality education, a skilled workforce, and a future of growth and success in southeastern Ohio.

Collectively, donor gifts help to sustain the present and secure the future for the college and for all those who want to improve their lives and the lives of their families.

Outright gifts often include gifts of cash, securities, or property for which the donor receives tax advantages. For example, in the case of gifts of appreciated securities, the donor is entitled to a charitable income tax deduction based upon the fair market value of the securities, and capital gains taxes are avoided.

Deferred gifts involve the irrevocable transfer of an asset to a charitable organization. The donor may retain either an income stream or the remainder interest. Current tax laws permit several planning alternatives for deferred gifts allowing the donor to receive a charitable income, gift, or estate tax deduction. These planned giving options include Charitable Remainder Trusts, Charitable Lead Trusts, Life Insurance, and others.

Bequests are gifts made to a charity as a named beneficiary in the donor's will or trust, and may provide for an outright or a split-interest gift. The donor's estate may receive an estate tax deduction for the value of the gift.

Employer Matching Gift Programs: Many employers have matching gift programs that match their employees' gifts of cash or appreciated securities, adding additional support in the name of the donor. When a donor gives a gift to a charity, he or she notifies the Human Resources department of the gift and completes the employer's matching gift form.

Donors are encouraged to discuss their planned gift and major gift plans for a charity with their attorney or financial planner.

What donor gifts accomplish:

- Defray the cost of education for those who need financial assistance to build a future for themselves and their families.
- Provide new facilities & educational equipment through institutional capital improvement.
- Provide leadership training and educational travel opportunities for students and faculty alike.
- Secure the college's future through deferred gifts.
- Support campus arts and cultural events provided to the community without charge.
- Kept at-risk students in college.

After two years as president of Washington State Community College I am looking forward to our future as we become an even stronger institution, more resilient, and more responsive to the needs of the community.



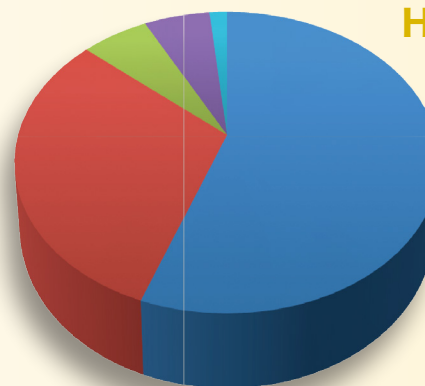
